Cleveland County, North Carolina Monthly Financials & Manager's Report

EXECUTIVE SUMMARY

Finance:

- The County has earned approx. \$370,000 in Investment Income year to date through November 30, 2018.
- The County has received \$3,255,000 in local option sales tax for the
 first two months of 2018-2019. This is in comparison to \$3,073,000
 received through the first two months of 2017-2018, or an 6%
 increase from prior year. Local option sales tax is received and
 recorded 3 months in arrears.
- The County's new audit firm, Thompson, Price, Scott and Adams, Co. (TPSA) completed final fieldwork during the month of October. The County's CAFR has been submitted to the LGC for review and approval on-time. During interim and final fieldwork TPSA reviewed over 500 invoices and 150 deposits, along with testing 8 major DSS programs. In comparison, in the prior year, the former audit firm reviewed approx. 250 invoices and deposits along with 3 major DSS programs. This change in the County's audit firm marks the first change in 14 years.
- The ERP-Keystone conversion and implementation process has been a tremendous success thus far. The Finance Department continues to fine tune more efficient ways to conduct day to day operations. The external transparency to vendors and clients has been very successful. This is the first major County-wide software update since 1989.

<u>RETENTION SCHEDULES</u>

Local governments may not destroy public records without the approval of the North Carolina Department of Natural and Cultural Resources (DNCR). The default rule is local government must contact DNCR every time it

wants to destroy a record. This is not administratively feasible, so DNCR has published retention schedules authorizing local governments to destroy certain records in certain ways. These schedules must be signed by the relevant County department heads and adopted by the Board of Commissioners in order to be valid. The Board of Commissioners adopted the retention schedule for County Management at its August 7, 2018 meeting. Staff now has retention schedules signed by department heads from Tax Administration, Veteran's Services, the Register of Deeds, and the Sheriff.

<u>ACTION:</u> Commissioner Bridges made a motion, seconded by Commissioner Whetstine, and passed unanimously by the Board to, *approve the retention schedules*. (copy found on Page _____ of Minute Book_____).

MORGAN STREET PROPERTY CONTRACT

Agreement for purchase of approximately 0.886-acre tract of real property located at 805 N. Morgan Street, Shelby, North Carolina, being more particularly depicted on Exhibit A attached hereto, being also commonly known as Cleveland County Tax Parcel No. 20254, together with all buildings, facilities, and other improvements located thereon; and all right, title and interest of Seller in and to easements, licenses, rights and appurtenances relating to any of the foregoing.

<u>ACTION:</u> Commissioner Bridges made a motion, seconded by Commissioner Whetstine, and passed unanimously by the Board to, *approve the agreement for purchase and sale of real property between Atrium*Health and Cleveland County. (copy found on Page _____ of Minute Book_____).

ENSONO INCENTIVE AGREEMENT

The rights and obligations arising under a contract can be, and routinely are, assigned to entities that were not parties to the original contract. This most often happens where one of the parties to the original contract sells a portion of its business or is acquired by another corporation. That is the case here. On August 3, 2010, the County entered into an incentive agreement with Infocrossing, Inc. related to Infocrossing's data center business. In March of 2016, Infocrossing transferred its data center business to Wipro Data Center and Cloud Services, Inc., and the County then assigned the incentive agreement to Wipro. Wipro has now sold the data center portion of its business to Ensono, LP. Ensono has therefore requested that the County now assign it the incentive agreement. This is merely a technical change to the incentive agreement – it has no additional financial impact on the County.

<u>ACTION:</u> Commissioner Bridges made the motion, seconded by Commissioner Whetstine and unanimously approved by the Board to, approve the Assignment of Incentive Agreement to Ensono.

ASSIGNMENT OF INCENTIVE AGREEMENT

WHEREAS, Cleveland County (hereinafter the "County") and Infocrossing, Inc. (hereinafter "Infocrossing") entered into an incentive agreement on August 3, 2010;

WHEREAS, Infocrossing reorganized in March of 2016 and transferred its data center business to its related activity, Wipro Data Center and Cloud Services, Inc. (hereinafter "Wipro"), and the County thereafter assigned the Infocrossing agreement to Wipro at its April 4, 2017 meeting;

WHEREAS, Ensono, LP (hereinafter "Ensono") has acquired the portion of Wipro's business that includes Wipro's incentive agreement with the County;

WHEREAS, Ensono has requested that the County's incentive agreement with Wipro be transferred to Ensono;

WHEREAS, this request is in wording only and has no financial impact upon the County;

THEREFORE, the Cleveland County Board of Commissioners hereby approves the reassignment of Wipro's incentive agreement to Ensono.

REGULAR AGENDA

AMERICAN RED CROSS DESIGN AND USUAGE

Chairwoman Allen recognized Assistant County Manager Kerri Melton to present the American Red Cross Design and Usage update. As with all large projects, this one is truly a team effort which included the legal department, finance, county maintenance, electronic maintenance and several other departments. The purpose of acquiring the American Red Cross (ARC) building is to extend the life of the Law Enforcement Center (LEC). A facility master plan was completed two years ago with a focus on additional space for the LEC. Since the plan's completion, it has been staff's intention to move several departments from the LEC to a different location. As part of the sale with the American Red Cross, the County agreed to lease 1,500 square feet of the 13,500 square footage of the building at no cost. Many community members donated to assist with construction costs for the ARC. It is the County's intent for the citizens to fell they are still getting great services from the building as departments transition into that location. The majority of the funds used to purchase the ARC building were proceeds received from sale of a cell tower site.





Chairwoman Allen opened the floor to the Board for questions or comments. Commissioner Hutchins inquired if the American Red Cross would be occupying or renting a portion of the building. County Manager Brian Epley replied as part of the advantageous purchase price for the building the County agreed to allot the ARC

1,500 square feet of administration space for a period of twenty years at no cost. Commissioners took turns commenting on the due diligence, hard work and team work that has gone in to make this a successful transition.

CLEVELAND COUNTY SCHOOLS RESOURCE OFFICER CONRACT

Chairwoman Allen called County Manager Brian Epley to the podium to present the Cleveland County Schools Resource Officer Contract. Cleveland County Schools received a school safety grant funding and requests to use the funds to create an additional School Resource Officer (SRO). There are currently seven county officers who make up the SRO division. If the contract is approved that number will go up to eight. The new deputy will be stationed at a school that is mutually agreed upon by the School Superintendent and the Sheriff. Staff is seeking approval for two items:

- 1. Approval of a new position to be added to the Sheriff's Office that will be assigned to the SRO unit and funded entirely through the school system, including the deferred maintenance and cost per capital.
- 2. Amendment of the existing contract moving from seven officers to eight.

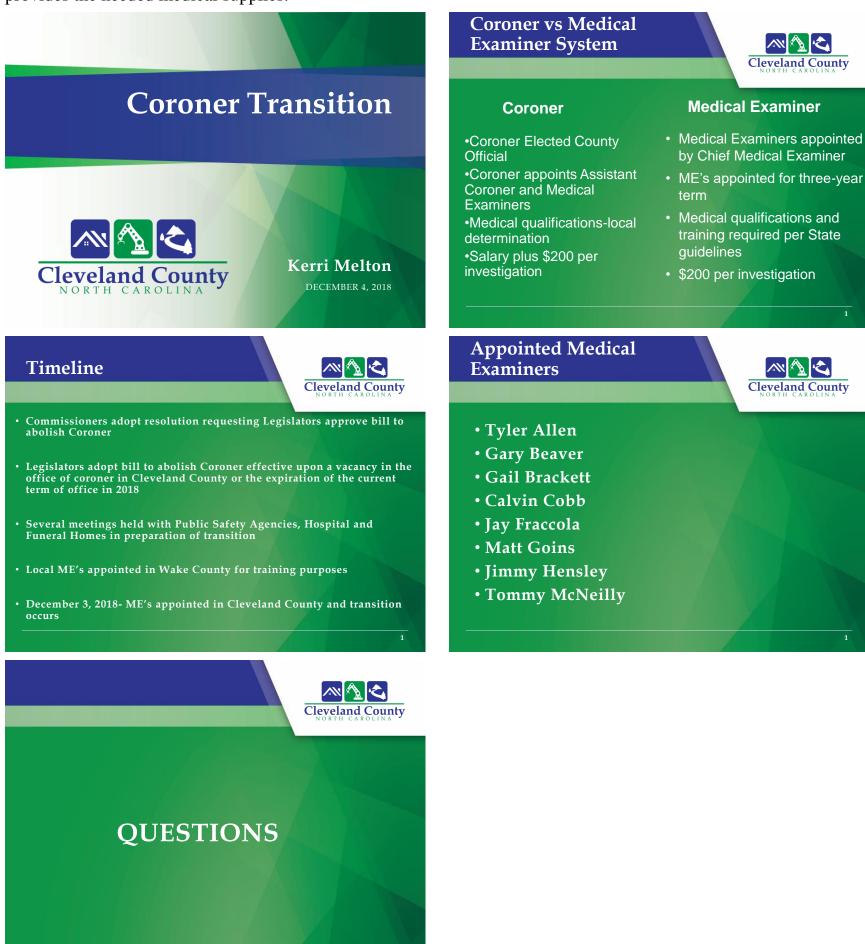
Chairwoman Allen opened the floor to the Board for questions and comments. Commissioner Whetstine inquired what costs would the County be responsible for the new position. Mr. Epley advised this position would be zero cost to the County. The Cleveland County School System will incur 100% of the costs related to the new position to include uniforms, vehicle and deferred maintenance.

<u>ACTION:</u> Commissioner Bridges made a motion, seconded by Commissioner Hardin, and passed unanimously by the Board to, approve a new position to be added to the Sheriff's Office that will be assigned to the SRO unit and funded entirely through the school system, including the deferred maintenance and cost per capital and the amendment of the existing contract moving from seven officers to eight. (copy found on Page _____ of Minute Book____).

CORONER TRANSITION

Chairwoman Allen again recognized Assistant County Manager Kerri Melton to present the Coroner Transition. On December 3, 2018 at 00:00 hours, the County transitioned from the Coroner system to the Medical Examiner system. Currently there are only three counties in North Carolina who operate under a Coroner's system, moving forward with a Medical Examiner's system is not uncommon. Legislators adopted bill to abolish the Coroner position effective upon a vacancy in the office of coroner in Cleveland County or the expiration of the current term of office in 2018. The County did not have a vacancy between 2017 and 2018, the current Coroner's position expired on December 3rd. Contact has been made with the Emergency Medical Services (EMS) Director and one of the Medical Examiners; there have been no local medical cases since the transition. Many of the appointed Medical Examiners are current County employees with EMS. Chairwoman Allen opened the floor to the Board for questions and comments. Commissioner Bridges asked what expenses the County will incur with the transition. Mrs. Melton stated the new system is a cost saver with only having to pay \$200 per investigation instead of a salary plus \$200 per investigation as it was with the Coroner System. The County will continue pay for

autopsies the same as under the Coroner System. The Medical Examiners use their own vehicles and the hospital provides the needed medical supplies.



COMMISSIONER REPRESENTATIVE BOARD APPOINTMENTS

<u>ACTION:</u> Commissioner Hutchins made the motion, seconded by Commissioner Whetstine, and unanimously adopted by the Board, to appoint Commissioner Bridges to serve on the CARE Block Grant Advisory Committee.

<u>ACTION:</u> Chairwoman Allen appointed herself to serve on the Cleveland County Economic Development Partnership Board.

COMMISSIONER REPORTS

Commissioner Hardin – outlined her on-boarding process and looks forward to serving the citizens of

Cleveland County.

Commissioner Bridges – has attended several events the past few days. One of the events was a seminar

discussing rural health in the community and ways to improve it.

Commissioner Whetstine – has gone to several Christmas parades and celebrations in the County. He also

spoke of the swearing in of Sheriff Norman and the deputies.

Commissioner Allen – welcomed the newly elected Commissioners and looks forward to serving with

them.

There being no further business to come before the Board at this time, Commissioner Bridges made a

motion, seconded by Commissioner Hardin, and unanimously adopted by the Board, to adjourn the meeting. The

next regular meeting of the Commission is scheduled for Tuesday, December 18, 2012 at 6:00 p.m. in the

Commissioners Chamber.

Subject: Revised SRO contract with Pinnacle Classical Academy

Summary Statement:

The Board of Commissioners recently executed a contract pursuant to which the County and Sheriff would provide a School Resource Officer ("SRO") to Pinnacle Classical Academy. Pinnacle Classical Academy has requested that some language required by statute be added to the contract.

Review:

The Board of Commissioners recently agreed to, in cooperation with the Cleveland County Sheriff, provide an SRO to Pinnacle Classical Academy pursuant to a contract for services with Pinnacle. Pinnacle has asked that the contract be revised to include some language regarding charter school debt that is required by N.C.G.S. § 115C-219.105(b). Other than the addition of this language in section 25 of the contract, the contract is exactly the same as the one executed by the Board of Commissioners previously.

Because Pinnacle has not yet signed the previously executed contract, it is easier for the County to simply execute a revised contract than to execute an addendum.

PINNACLE CLASSICAL ACADEMY AND THE CLEVELAND COUNTY BOARD OF COMMISSIONERS/CLEVELAND COUNTY SHERIFF'S OFFICE CONTRACT FOR SERVICES

This Contract is made, entered into, and intended to take effect November 1, 2018, by and between Pinnacle Classical Academy ("PINNACLE") and the Cleveland County Board of Commissioners (the "County") and the Cleveland County Sheriff's Office (the "Sheriff").

Definitions

"School Resource Officer" or "SRO" means a sworn law enforcement officer responsible for safety and crime prevention in schools.

"School Administrator" means the person or persons in charge of the administration of affairs at a school.

"Headmaster" means the Headmaster of Pinnacle School, Robert Brown, and his successor(s) in that position.

For and in consideration of the mutual promises set forth in this Contract, the parties do mutually agree as follows:

- 1. **Obligations of County.** County agrees to provide services or goods as follows:
 - A. County will supply the services of one (1) sworn law enforcement officer to serve as a School Resource Officer beginning November 1, 2018 for the 2018-2019 school year. The officer shall be assigned full-time to provide their services to PINNACLE.
 - B. The assignment of and services provided by School Resource Officer shall be consistent with the terms of this contract.
 - C. The term of this Contract starts in November 1, 2018 and runs through May 31, 2019. The contract will be automatically renewed for additional one (1) year periods, based on County's fiscal year (July 1-June 30), not to exceed a total of six (6) renewals.
 - D. PINNACLE and County further agree that the SROs provided by County are not employees of PINNACLE nor are they agents for any purpose in the performance of their duties.
- 2. <u>Obligations of PINNACLE</u>. PINNACLE will compensate County at the following rates and in the following manner for the services rendered by the SROs:

- A. The total cost to PINNACLE for the services provided pursuant to this Contract shall not exceed a total of the base salary, taxes, and benefits for one (1) law enforcement officer and deferred maintenance for capital management which includes necessary operational equipment as defined in ADDENDUM B. Deferred maintenance will be divided over six years beginning in FY 18/19 (see ADDENDUM B for first year costs). Remaining years of the contract will be billed at an annual rate that is mutually agreed upon between the Cleveland County Manager and Headmaster of Pinnacle.
- B. Payments shall be made by PINNACLE upon receipt of an invoice from County.
- C. Should County be unable to or otherwise fail to provide the services specified, County will refund a pro rata share of the payment per officer based on a 10-month school year.

3. Obligations of Sheriff. Sheriff agrees to provide services as follows:

- A. The Sheriff shall assign regularly employed law enforcement officers to serve as SROs in certain CCS schools. Each assigned SRO will be a certified law enforcement officer by the State of North Carolina and must complete a forty (40) hour School Resource Officer training course through the North Carolina Justice Academy and Crisis Intervention Training (CIT) certification through the Cleveland County CIT training program at Cleveland Community College, or other CIT provider approved by the Sheriff. If an officer does not possess SRO training and/or CIT certification at the time of assignment, the Sheriff will ensure that the officer participates in any necessary coursework to receive the training and certification at the next available course offering.
- B. SRO positions shall be filled by the Sheriff's directives and selection process. SROs should have no substantiated evidence of harassment, discrimination, disproportionate minority contact, improper use of force, or other serious performance issues in their work history that would make the officer inappropriate for performing duties as a SRO.
- C. Each quarter, the Sheriff's Office will provide to PINNACLE reports of the number of PINNACLE student referrals to the adult criminal justice system, juvenile petitions, teen court referrals, and/or referrals to an outside mediation program.

4. Expectations of the SRO while on Campus

A. The SRO shall remain on school grounds during normal school hours, except when necessary to attend any meetings or trainings. The SRO shall wear the official law enforcement apparel issued by the Sheriff's Office at all times and shall make best efforts to maintain visibility at all times when practical and safe to do so. Security

- services for extracurricular activities held outside of school hours shall be addressed through a separate contract.
- B. The School Administrator shall be solely responsible for implementing the discipline procedures and has primary responsibility for maintaining order in the school environment. In cases where school disciplinary investigations and law enforcement investigations into criminal activity overlap, it may be necessary for school administration and SRO to work in tandem.
- C. The SRO shall report any safety concerns to school administration and shall confer with the headmaster to develop plans and strategies to prevent and/or minimize dangerous situations on or near the campus or involving students at school related activities.
- D. The SRO shall comply with all applicable laws, regulations and policies regarding access to confidential student records.
- 5. <u>County Supervisor.</u> Sheriff Alan Norman is designated as the County Supervisor for County. The Cleveland County Sheriff's Office has complete discretion in designating the County Supervisor as another person of its choosing.
- 6. <u>Project Coordinator</u>. Robert Brown is designated as the Project Coordinator for PINNACLE. The Project Coordinator shall be PINNACLE's representative in connection with the County's performance under this Contract. PINNACLE has complete discretion in replacing the Project Coordinator with another person of its choosing.
- 7. **Termination for Convenience.** This Contract may be terminated by either party, without cause, so long as the party wishing to terminate provides the other party with a minimum of ninety (90) days written notice at the address listed immediately below:

If PINNACLE wishes to terminate in accordance with this or any other section of this Contract, County shall be paid by PINNACLE in an amount which bears the same ratio to the total compensation of services actually performed.

8. <u>Termination for Default.</u> Any party may terminate this Contract immediately and without prior notice upon breach of this Contract. However, each party must provide the other with

- subsequent written notice that it has exercised its right to terminate the Contract within ten (10) calendar days of termination.
- 9. <u>Contract Funding.</u> It is understood and agreed between the parties that the payment obligation of PINNACLE under this Contract is contingent upon the availability of appropriated funds from which payment for Contract purposes can be made.
- 10. <u>Accounting Procedures.</u> County shall comply with accounting and fiscal management procedures prescribed by PINNACLE that apply to this Contract. County shall assure such fiscal control and accounting procedures as may be necessary for proper disbursement of and accounting for all project funds.
- 11. <u>Improper Payments.</u> County shall refund to PINNACLE any payment made pursuant to this Contract if it is subsequently determined by audit that such payment by PINNACLE was illegal. Such refunds shall be made within thirty (30) days after PINNACLE notifies County in writing that a payment has been determined to be illegal.
- 12. <u>Contract Transfer.</u> County shall not assign, subcontract or otherwise transfer any interest in this Contract without the prior written approval of PINNACLE.
- 13. <u>Contract Personnel.</u> County agrees that it has, or will secure at its own expense, all personnel required to perform the services set forth in this Contract.
- 14. Contract Modifications. This Contract may be amended only by written amendment duly executed by both parties. However, minor modifications may be made by the PINNACLE Project Coordinator to take advantage of unforeseen opportunities that: (a) do not change the intent of the Contract or the scope of County's performance; (b) do not increase County's total compensation or method of payment; and (c) either improve the overall quality of the product or service to PINNACLE without increasing the cost, or reduce the total cost quality of the product or service without reducing the quantity or quality. All such minor modifications to the Contract must be recorded in writing and signed by both the Project Coordinator and County, and placed on file with this Contract. No price adjustments will be made unless the procedure has been included in the Contract and a maximum allowable amount stipulated.
- 15. <u>Insurance.</u> County shall maintain minimum insurance requirements for sworn law enforcement officer assigned as School Resource Officer pursuant to the attached Addendum A.
- 16. **Relationship of the Parties.** County and PINNACLE shall be independent and nothing herein shall be construed as creating a partnership or joint venture; nor shall any employee of either party be construed as employees, agents, or principals of the other party. Both parties maintain control over their personnel and any employment rights of personnel

assigned under this Contract shall not be abridged. Both parties agree to assume the liability for their own acts or omissions, or the acts or omissions of their employees or agents, during the term of this Agreement to the extent permitted under North Carolina law.

- 17. <u>Advertising.</u> The Contract will not be used in connection with any advertising by County without prior written approval of PINNACLE.
- 18. <u>Conflict of Interest.</u> County represents and warrants that no member of PINNACLE or any of its employees or officers who may obtain a direct benefit, personal gain or advantage for themselves or a relative or associate as a result of this Contract has been involved in making the Contract or will be involved in administering the Contract. County shall cause this paragraph to be included in all Contracts, subcontracts and other agreements related to the Contract.
- 19. Monitoring and Evaluation. County shall cooperate with PINNACLE, or with any other person or agency as directed by PINNACLE, in monitoring, inspecting, auditing, or investigating activities related to this Contract. County shall permit PINNACLE to evaluate all activities conducted under this Contract.
- 20. <u>Financial Responsibility.</u> County is financially solvent and able to perform under this Contract. If requested by PINNACLE, County agrees to provide a copy of its latest audited annual financial statements or other financial statements as deemed acceptable by PINNACLE's Finance Officer.
- 21. **No Third Party Benefits.** This Contract shall not be considered by County to create any benefits on behalf of any third party. County shall include in all contracts, subcontracts or other agreements relating to this Contract an acknowledgment by the contracting parties that this Contract creates no third party benefits.
- 22. <u>Enforceability.</u> This Contract shall not be enforceable unless signed by the Chairman of PINNACLE Board, the Chair of Cleveland County Board of Commissioners, and the Cleveland County Sheriff.
- 23. **Entire Agreement.** This Contract, constitutes and express the entire agreement and understanding between the parties concerning the subject matter of this Contract. This document (including exhibits, if any) any purchase order used in connection with this Contract and any other document expressly incorporated in this Contract by reference, supersede all prior and contemporaneous discussions, promises, representations, agreements and understandings related to the subject matter of this Contract.
- 24. <u>Contract Situs.</u> All matters, whether sounding in contract or tort relating to the validity, construction, interpretation, and enforcement of this Contract, will be determined in

Cleveland County, North Carolina. North Carolina law will govern the interpretation and construction of this Contract.

25. Indemnification of the State of North Carolina. No indebtedness of any kind incurred or created by a charter school shall constitute an indebtedness of the State of North Carolina and/or its political subdivisions, and no indebtedness of a charter school shall involve or be secured by the faith, credit, or taxing power of the State of North Carolina and /or its political subdivisions. The parties to this contract agree to indemnify and hold harmless the State of North Carolina for any indebtedness related to this Service Agreement.

- WHEREAS, N.C.G.S. §§153A-76 and 153A-77 set out the authority of county boards of commissioners over commissions, boards, and agencies; and
- WHEREAS, N.C.G.S. §153A-77(a) authorizes a county board of commissioners to assume direct control of any activities theretofore conducted by or through any commission, board, or agency, including the board of social services, by the adoption of a resolution assuming and conferring upon the board of county commissioners all powers, responsibilities, and duties of such commission, board, or agency; and
- WHEREAS, the Cleveland County Board of Commissioners (the "Board of Commissioners") states its intention to abolish the Cleveland County Board of Social Services (the "Board of Social Services") and to assume and confer upon the Board of Commissioners all powers, responsibilities, and duties of the Board of Social Services; and
- WHEREAS, the Board of Commissioners may exercise the power and authority conferred by statute after a public hearing held by said Board pursuant to thirty (30) days' notice of said public hearing given in a newspaper having general circulation in Cleveland County; and
- **WHEREAS**, a Notice of Public Hearing in this matter was published on November 14, 2018 in the *Shelby Star*, a newspaper having general circulation in Cleveland County; and
- **WHEREAS**, said public hearing was held at a regular meeting of the Board of Commissioners on December 18, 2018;
- **NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED**, that the Cleveland County Board of Commissioners, pursuant to N.C.G.S. §§153A-76 and 153A-77(a), does hereby abolish the Board of Social Services and assume and confer upon the Board of Commissioners all powers, responsibilities, and duties of the Board of Social Services, effective as of the date hereof.

Subject: Creation and Bylaws of Cleveland County Social Services Advisory Board

Summary Statement:

Should the Board of Commissioners decide to assume the powers and responsibilities of the county DSS board, staff recommends creating an advisory board to assist the Board of Commissioners in managing DSS activities.

Review:

In the case that the Board of Commissioners ("BOC") decides to assume the powers and duties of the county DSS board, the BOC may further decide to create a DSS advisory board to assist it in overseeing and managing DSS activities. N.C.G.S. § 153A-76 generally authorizes the Board of Commissioners to organize county government, and N.C.G.S. § 153A-77(a) specifically allows the creation of advisory boards. The attached resolution would accomplish the creation of this DSS advisory board.

The resolution further refers to bylaws, which are attached as part of the resolution. The bylaws I have drafted immediately install on the advisory board the current DSS board in their current roles to serve out their current terms. The bylaws further allow the Board of Commissioners to appoint two more members to the advisory board. The advisory board will meet at the same place and time as the current DSS board. It will further have the power to amend its own bylaws as necessary, subject to the oversight of the Board of Commissioners.

RESOLUTION CREATING CLEVELAND COUNTY SOCIAL SERVICES ADVISORY BOARD (G.S. 153A-76; G.S. 153A-77(A))

WHEREAS, N.C.G.S. § 153A-76 authorizes the Board of Commissioners to generally organize county government in order to promote the orderly and efficient administration of county affairs; and

WHEREAS, the Board of Commissioners has, following a properly noticed public hearing, assumed direct control over all activities heretofore conducted by and through the Department of Social Services Board pursuant to N.C.G.S. § 153A-77(a); and

WHEREAS, N.C.G.S. § 153A-77(a) further authorizes the Board of Commissioners to appoint advisory boards composed of qualified and interested residents to study, interpret, and develop community support and cooperation in activities conducted by or under the authority of the Board of Commissioners; and

WHEREAS, the Board of Commissioners is convened in a regular meeting;

THEREFORE, THE BOARD OF COMMISSIONERS OF CLEVELAND COUNTY RESOLVES THAT:

CLEVELAND COUNTY SOCIAL SERVICES ADVISORY BOARD BYLAWS

I. <u>Definitions</u>

- **a.** "Advisory Board" refers to the Cleveland County Social Services Advisory Board.
- **b.** "Board of Commissioners" refers to the Cleveland County Board of Commissioners.
- **c. "Commissioner"** refers to a member of the Cleveland County Board of Commissioners.
- **d. "DSS"** refers to the Cleveland County Department of Social Services.
- **e. "Member"** refers to a member of this Cleveland County Social Services Advisory Board.
- **f.** "County Clerk" refers to the person who occupies the role of Clerk to the Board of Commissioners as defined by N.C.G.S. § 153A-111.

II. MEMBERS

There shall be seven (7) members of the Advisory Board who shall be nominated by the Board of Commissioners. Members of the Advisory Board shall serve without compensation. Members will serve as an advocate for the clients of DSS and for those programs and initiatives that serve clients. Members are expected to attend all regular and special meetings. If it is necessary to be absent from a meeting, the member must notify the Advisory Board Chair and the DSS Director.

III.DUTIES

As the Board of Commissioners has assumed all powers and duties of the county social services board pursuant to N.C.G.S. §§ 153A-76 and 153A-77(a), it is the duty of the members of the Advisory Board to assist and advise the Board of Commissioners in carrying out the duties described in N.C.G.S. § 108A-9.

IV. COMPOSITION

Seats 1, 2, 3, 4, and 5 shall be initially filled as provided for in Section VI of these bylaws. Seats 6 and 7 shall be initially filled by the Board of Commissioners in any manner not inconsistent with these bylaws.

Seat 1 shall be occupied by a current member of the Board of Commissioners. Seats 2-7 may be filled by the Board of Commissioners in any manner not inconsistent with these bylaws.

In the event that the current Commissioner who serves on the Advisory Board is no longer able or willing to do so, the Board of Commissioners shall appoint another

commissioner to occupy that seat. Should a vacancy arise on this Advisory Board in any seat other than Seat 1, the Board of Commissioners may appoint any person to fill the remainder of the term for the vacant seat.

V. TERMS

The terms of the initial members of the Advisory Board shall be as provided for in Section VI of these bylaws. Otherwise, members shall serve a term of four (4) years from the date of appointment. This four-year period shall be calculated in the manner prescribed for civil actions by Rule 6(a) of the North Carolina Rules of Civil Procedure. Members can be reappointed at the end of a four-year term, and there is no limit on the number of terms that a person can serve.

VI. INITIAL MEMBERS

There shall be five (5) initial members of the Advisory Board whose terms shall be as follows:

VII. OFFICERS

a. Officers Designated: The officers of the Advisory Board shall be a chair, vice-chair, DSS Director, DSS Deputy Director, DSS Assistant Director of Plans and Operations, and Advisory Board Clerk. Should there at any time not be a DSS Deputy Director or DSS Assistant Director of Plans and Operations, the DSS Director may appoint any DSS employee to serve as an officer of the Advisory Board instead.

b. Duties of Officers:

- i. The Chair is a member of the Advisory Board and shall preside at all regular and special meetings, delegate tasks to members, and see that all correspondence and business of the Advisory Board is carried out. The Chair shall act as spokesperson for the Advisory Board and perform such duties as shall be delegated to him or her by the Advisory Board.
- ii. The Vice-Chair is a member of the Advisory Board and shall, in the absence of the Chair, have the authority and perform the duties of the Chair.

- iii. The DSS Director is the person who occupies the position of County Director of Social Services as described in N.C.G.S. § 108A-12. The DSS Director shall make a reasonable effort to attend all meetings of the Advisory Board in order to inform and advise the Advisory Board about the activities of DSS. The DSS Director shall further act as the executive officer of the Advisory Board and as its secretary.
- iv. The DSS Deputy Director shall make a reasonable effort to attend all meetings of the Advisory Board in order to support the DSS Director.
- v. The DSS Assistant Director of Plans and Operations shall make a reasonable effort to attend all meetings of the Advisory Board in order to support the DSS Director.
- vi. The Advisory Board Clerk shall be appointed by the DSS Director and shall attend all meetings of the Advisory Board. The Advisory Board Clerk shall keep and provide access to minutes and agendas as provided in Section VIII of these bylaws and shall generally ensure that the Advisory Board conducts its business in an orderly manner.

VIII. <u>Meetings</u>

- **a. Parliamentary Procedure:** In all matters not otherwise inconsistent with these Bylaws, <u>Roberts Rules of Order</u> shall govern meetings of the Advisory Board.
- **b. Regular Meetings:** Will be held the last Monday of each month at 4 p.m. at the Cleveland County Department of Social Services. All meetings shall be noticed in accordance with N.C.G.S. § 143-318.12.
- **c. Quorum:** Shall consist of a simple majority of the authorized membership of the Advisory Board. The authorized membership shall not include vacant positions or members who are disqualified from voting.
- **d. Telephonic Communication:** Members may participate in regular and special meetings via telephone, video chat, or any similar form of constant and instantaneous communication. For the purposes of counting attendance, a member participating telephonically shall be counted as present.
- **e. Minutes:** Shall be kept for each meeting. Previous meeting minutes shall be emailed or mailed to Advisory Board members prior to the next regular

meeting. Copies of minutes shall be provided to the County Clerk.

- **f. Agenda:** For forthcoming meetings, the agenda will be provided in time to allow members to prepare for those meetings. Copies of the agenda will be provided to the County Clerk.
- **g. Vote:** No member shall vote for, on behalf of, or in any way exercise the vote of another member.
- **h. Closed Session:** May be called in accordance with N.C.G.S. § 143-318.11.
- i. Special Meetings: May be called at any time by the Chair, or at the request of a simple majority of the authorized membership of the Advisory Board, or at the request of the Board of Commissioners. All meetings shall be called in accordance with N.C.G.S. § 143-318.12.

IX. CONFLICT OF INTEREST

No member of the Advisory Board shall vote on a question in which he or she has any personal or financial interest. The member shall declare that he or she has a conflict and shall not participate in the deliberations or be considered as a part of the necessary quorum. A question regarding whether a matter involves a conflict of interest shall be resolved by the Advisory Board.

X. AMENDMENTS

These bylaws may be amended in either of the following manners:

- **a.** By a majority vote of the Advisory Board. Any amendment done in this manner shall not take effect until 30 days until after approval. During this 30-day period, the Board of Commissioners may, by a majority vote, cancel the amendment or accelerate its effective date.
- **b.** By a majority vote of the Board of Commissioners.

The 30-day time period described in Section X-a shall be computed in the manner prescribed by Rule 6(a) of the North Carolina Rules of Civil Procedure.

XI. ADOPTION

These bylaws were adopted by the Board of Commissioners at its regular meeting on December 18, 2018.
